Spelling list: Plurals ending in -ies

In English, when we want to indicate that there is more than one of something, we often change the spelling of the word by adding -ies to the end. This is a common way to form plurals for words that end in a consonant followed by y.

Watch out for words that end in a *vowel* followed by *y* . In these cases, simply add an *s* to form the plural.

Spelling tip: If you are unsure whether to use *-ies* or simply *-s*, see if the word ends with a *consonant* followed by y. If it does, use *-ies* to create the plural. If it ends with a *vowel* followed by y, use *-s*. For example, *story* becomes *stories*, but *play* becomes *plays*.

Ponies Rosie loves to ride **ponies**.

Ladies The **ladies** were wearing funny hats.

Babies Babies like to drink milk.

Lorries The **lorries** were very noisy as they went past the house.

Fairies Fairies can do magic.

Berries The children picked **berries** and nuts.

Spies The **spies** were on a secret mission.

Cities Plymouth is just one of the **cities** in the United Kingdom.

Bullies There are no **bullies** at my school.

Parties I love **parties** because they make me joyful.

Families Our **families** are very important.

Dictionaries There are several **dictionaries** in the school library.
