Spelling list: ue words

In English, the *ue* spelling pattern is often used to represent the long /*u*/ sound. This sound is commonly heard in words like *blue*, *clue*, and *rescue*.

When spelling the long /u/ sound with the ue pattern, remember that it is usually found at the end of a word after a consonant. For example, in the word cue, the consonant c is followed by the ue pattern.

It's important to be aware of this spelling pattern when encountering new words to avoid confusion. Test yourself on the examples in this word list to help you get used to how *ue* is often found at the end of a word.

cue In the game of snooker, you hit the ball with a **cue** .

due The plane was delayed **due** to fog.

hue The sky had a reddish **hue** at sunset.

sue She threatened to **sue** him.

argue Why do you always **argue** with me?

ensue I am sure chaos will **ensue** .

statue There is a famous nude **statue** in the museum.

tissue Would you like a **tissue**?

value The approximate **value** for the house was \$300,000.

virtue The prophets were men of **virtue**.

barbecue Dan cooked the chicken on the **barbecue** .

continue We need to assess this situation before we **continue**.
